Launch of European Network "Social Services Europe"

(Brussels, 12 December 2011) Today a new European network, Social Services Europe, was launched to strengthen the profile and position of social services, and to promote the role of not-for-profit social service providers throughout Europe.

It brings together seven Europe-wide networks of not-for-profit providers of social and health care services, SOLIDAR, Eurodiaconia, the European Platform for Rehabilitation (EPR), Workability Europe, European Federation of National Organizations Working with the Homeless (FEANTSA), the European Association of Service Providers for Persons with Disabilities (EASPD) and the European Platform for National Non-Profit Umbrella Organizations and for National Associations of General Interest (CEDAG).

Social Services Europe will also work on social dialogue, a key component of the European social model underlining that "in spite of

the growing importance of social and health services, which may account for more than 10 % of total employment in some Member States, there coverage by the traditional social partners is still quite poor. Yet, social dialogue is likely to have farreaching consequences on a series of issues such as working conditions, skills management and quality of services. It may also help addressing bottlenecks such as staff shortage.

Several attempts have already been made to have our sectors involved in projects aiming at improving this situation. New perspectives are emerging again and should be encouraged. Next to social dialogue, Social Services Europe will focus on various other staff and HR issues such as qualifications and competencies of staff, working conditions and professional development" (cf.
