Transformation of the waste management business

- The industry has undergone a significant transformation in recent years
- Europe is reducing reliance on landfill disposal and increasing rates of recycling
- The industry's activities have become more labour intensive
- Waste collection systems have adapted
- More sophisticated systems for the collection and treatment of waste



Increased focus on health and safety

- Increased scrutiny of health and safety in the waste management sector
- Every year, people are killed or injured at work
- Waste collection activities pose the greatest risk
- Consequently, FEAD members are taking pro-active actions on health and safety



Measures to better tackle the issue

- FEAD members have chosen different instruments and measures to address health and safety issues in the waste management business:
 - ✓ Set-up of Working Groups at association level
 - ✓ Accident reduction programmes
 - ✓ Awareness-raising campaigns
 - √ Cooperation with national H&S bodies



Working Groups at FEAD member association level

- WGs on health and safety have been set up by a number of FEAD member associations, for instance, in the UK, Germany, the Netherlands, Belgium, France, Finland etc.
- H&S is considered a non-competitive issue
- WGs serve for information-exchange and to jointly assess sources of accidents



Accident reduction programmes

- United Kingdom (ESA)
 - Adoption of an accident reduction programme (H&S strategy) which was firstly adopted in 2006 and has since been periodically reviewed.
 - The current H&S strategy targets five key areas:
 - Slips trips and falls;
 - Manual handling;
 - Workplace transport;
 - Machinery safety;
 - Occupational health.
 - In 2012 ESA will renew its Health and Safety Strategy, with a strong focus on sickness absence.
 - ESA has adopted an Accident Reduction Charter which includes a target to reduce accidents, every year, by 10% up until 2013
 - In 2010, ESA achieved a 13.5% reduction in accidents from the previous year.



Awareness-raising campaigns

Germany (BDE)

- Joint development of media package by waste management companies, German insurance bodies and labour unions ("Medien für die Entsorgungswirtschaft" – "Media for the waste management business")

 - The QESH workgroup aims to develop 'toolbox' forms to be distributed to all FEBEM-FEGE members
- France (FNADE): Awareness-raising campaigns at company level



Cooperation with national H&S bodies

France

- FNADE is actively involved in INRS projects
 (INRS = Institut national de recherche et de sécurité) related to:
 - Chemicals risks arising from the recycling of WEEE and metals;
 - Biological risks from the biological treatment of waste (composting etc.);
 - Musculoskeletal disorders.
